





At Doctors Worldwide, we believe that good health enables people and communities to define their own future. Without good health, a parent cannot take care of their family, nor can a child meet their full potential.



38 local partners and organisations directly worked with or benefited from our activities this year, including a further **2 international partners and a UN agency**.



155,767 patient consultations this year.




6,908 people received nutritional support this year.




390 babies delivered this year.



56 training sessions delivered by DWW on a variety of medical topics including COVID, plus a conference on Health Leadership



567 newborn babies and children provided with life saving care, nutrition and social care support.



203 medical and healthcare workers trained and their capacity built by DWW, including **66 clinical leaders** who benefited a further **2,915 staff members** that they manage.



10 projects run in 7 countries, with a further 6 countries indirectly benefiting.



93 Medical volunteers across the globe were involved in our projects by delivering training sessions, producing teaching resources, deploying overseas, and conducting peer panel reviews.



2,324 births, ANC and PNC support for mothers and babies.



73 clinics and hospitals rehabilitated, providing staff support and capacity building.



100 training resources developed to build local capacity and strengthen health systems.

Our Projects

This year we served communities in:

Uganda

DWW is helping to administer a **research project in partnership with the Uganda UK Health Alliance (UUKHA)** looking at triage interventions, procedures and processes in the emergency department of four referral hospitals around Uganda through a grant obtained via the Royal College of Emergency Medicine (RCEM).


Rwanda

1839 people benefited from our **Palliative Care project** and **Medical Debt Relief project** this year. **66 patients** received a **holistic package of palliative care** including food and shelter and a further **97 children** received additional support including education. **10 microfinance projects** were launched to support vulnerable families with palliative patients to earn a living.

The provision of the **DWW community ambulance** has facilitated hundreds of COVID vaccinations during lockdown for the most vulnerable and clinically high risk patients. **157 patients** unable to afford medical care including vulnerable mothers and babies had their medical debt cleared by DWW.

Malawi

50,321 patients, mothers and children received healthcare support, medication, ANC/PNC and safe births through our **Health System Strengthening Programme**. **20 clinics** were also supported through rehabilitation and training opportunities, including providing local midwives, nurses and clinical officers. We are also in the process of **building a new primary care clinic and maternity clinic** in the Balaka area of Malawi.



Nepal

We **worked with a local NGO** that provides healthcare across remote villages and clinics to **better prepare and respond to COVID-19**.

Several training sessions occurred for a variety of healthcare workers as well as assessments to support facilities to be COVID ready using **DWW COVID-19 checklists**.

Bangladesh

As a result of the **PGF and DICE programme**, we **trained 84 doctors, nurses and medical assistants across 32 clinics** to deliver better quality emergency care and humanitarian medicine. We also conducted the very **first Leadership & Governance conference, training 55 clinical managers from 37 clinics**. The PGF project was selected as an example of **SDG Good Practices and promoted on the UN DESA platform**. The project is also being published in the Second Edition of the 'SDG Good Practices: A compilation of success stories and lessons learned in SDG implementation'.

Pakistan

As a result of our **Pakistan project**, **8559 patients** benefited this year through vital medical consultation, medication and maternity support for mothers through ANC, PNC and safe births. **2,800 nutritional meals** were also provided for the most vulnerable people.

Globally and COVID

We delivered **13 training sessions** to support healthcare workers in difficult and resource-limiting settings within the COVID19 context. **16 DWW medical specialists** from around the world delivered a variety of topics such as primary care response, vaccines, mental health and more. Countries that benefited include Chad, Ethiopia, Philippines, Kenya, Bangladesh, Pakistan and Nepal.
